St Andrew's interregnum (being 'in-between' vicars) is now underway: and it's been quite a challenging prospect. As a small child I was once taken to the Farnborough Air Show. I don't remember much of what would have been a very full day; but I do vividly recall seeing one massivelooking aircraft starting up and heading down the runway. It didn't look as if anything that big could possibly lift off;

but, amid a lot of noisy roaring, it suddenly began to rise like a sort of monstrous bird .. and even circled round in the sky high over our heads.

Starting this interregnum had something of the same feel. Gorleston Links Bowls Club

We are a hardy bunch at bowls, not your average wilting wallflowers, we can't be, not with the range of weather

conditions we put up with throughout the season!

How else do you account for the fact that after two weeks of bone dry, wall to wall, glorious sunshine we visit a club to play a match, get halfway through it when the heavens open and we are in the middle of a downpour. Coats and hats on, grip gel on the hands, raindrops dripping off noses, chins and soggy sleeve cuffs... A halt to the game is called... into the clubhouse we go... the rain stops... out we go again... more rain... in again... "Lets reschedule"... followed by another glorious week of sunshine!



Then we have a match day on the cliffs and it gets a bit windy, everyone says "it's sunny and mild in my back garden"! You have to laugh...

It all adds up to experience for relative newbies, as well as the seasoned professionals with that look of 'we have seen it all before'. Just watch the expressions on bowlers faces, deep concentration, disgust at a shot they knew they should have got... ooohhh, that was close!... and gaping disbelief when someone sneaks in a bowl with a 'wick', which is when a bowl comes in after hitting off another bowl. It's a great position to be in, quite unique to many other clubs, so the weather is just a little 'added extra' I think we can put up with.

Competitions are in full swing, we are doing well in most of them, there is always that one match where the opposition just walk away with it, usually the best players seem to hardly make an effort, long standing players who give off this air of calm authority.

Many clubs have their own terminology for shots or directions. One lovely lady from Kings Lynn would say 'wiff waff, wiff waff', which means the jack going left or right when positioning it. Then there is a 'sheepdog' which literally means what it says, a bowl that herds round the other bowls. 'London underground' is another which is

Paediatric Diabetes Team Open Day

On Monday 30 May, our Paediatric Diabetes team staged a fun day for young patients with diabetes and it proved to be a huge success, with lots of stands and fun entertainment, including dinosaurs!

The open day, held in the Burrage Centre on the James Paget site, saw children and young people and their families invited along to meet reps from various pump companies to find out more about the latest equipment and technology to help manage the condition, and to hear from experts, including Mr Keshta, pictured below and bottom, an Instagram bodybuilding star, coach and nutritionist who lives with Type 1 diabetes.



Alongside this there were lots of fun activities to try including face painting, Tropic pampering, colouring a banner for the Diabetes Games later in the year, and the chance to pick up a range of freebies.

One of the highlights were the dinosaurs from the Dino 2 Hire Roadshow, who were a big hit with our Paediatric Diabetes team as well as the dozens of young visitors who popped in throughout the day, from 10am to 5pm.

James Paget University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust

James Paget becomes the first hospital in the UK to start life-changing peanut allergy treatment

Building on an international network of pioneering research into life-threatening peanut allergies, the James Paget has become the first hospital in the country to provide a Peanut Allergy Desensitisation clinic using the newly NICE approved drug PALFORZIA.

Approval of the drug by the National Institute for Clinical Excellence (NICE) is the latest step in five years of extensive research into peanut allergies, one of the most common food allergies that affects more than 6 million people in Europe and America.

The James Paget has been part of the global ARTEMIS research trial, which involved 175 children aged 4-17 years across seven European countries, to develop an oral immunotherapy to tackle peanut allergies. ARTEMIS saw young patients receive steadily increased doses of the drug over a period of up to 40 weeks, under strictly controlled conditions, while others received a placebo.

The first PALFORZIA clinics took place at the James Paget, on 9 June 2022.

GP streaming unit

A new facility which will help reduce numbers of patients waiting unnecessarily in a busy Emergency Department has opened its doors at the James Paget (JPUH).

The new 'GP streaming' unit will provide care for patients who attend A&E and are assessed as not needing hospital treatment but need care instead from a general practitioner.

A streaming service has been in operation at the JPUH since last autumn, and has seen more than 6700 patients since then.


On average, some 40 patients per day have been directed to the service, so that they can receive appropriate treatment without having to wait to be seen by busy Emergency Department staff.

The success of the service has resulted in the Trust creating a standalone GP streaming unit, which is located at the front of the hospital near the Louise Hamilton Centre.

The Trust has worked with North Norfolk Primary Care (NNPC) - a GP provider organisation delivering a range of clinical services across the county - to provide the GP streaming service.


The Trust has invested more than £900,000 into the unit, which was created within the space of just 13 weeks, with the foundations excavated on 16 February. The building units, constructed by Elliotts Modular Build, were put in place at the end of March with final works completed on 20 May.

People should only attend the hospital's Emergency Department if it is a genuine emergency; if you are unsure what to do, you can call NHS 111 and they can direct you to the most appropriate place and even book you a time slot with another health service or the Emergency Department if necessary.



The Summer Reading Challenge 2022 will be launching in Norfolk Libraries on Saturday 23rd July. It's free, it's fun, it builds confidence and supports children reading for pleasure. Children's reading can 'dip' during the long summer break making it harder for them on returning to school. In addition, reading for pleasure has so many proven benefits including developing empathy by identifying with characters and improving mental wellbeing.

This year the theme is Gadgeteers. It has been produced by the Reading Agency in partnership with the Science Museum Group and is a celebration of science and innovation. It will be delivered by Norfolk Library and Information Service and there will be lots of exciting activities in your local libraries.

Over 700,000 children sign up to the challenge every year. You can sign your children up at your local library from the 23rd July. To join the challenge children will need to be a library member. This is free of charge and children will receive their own library card for which there are no overdue fees.

Children will be given their Gadgeteers pack, have the opportunity to be involved in lots of fun, free activities and get to set their own reading challenge (we recommend six books over the six-week period). Children choose their own books which can include e-books from our virtual library. The children will collect stickers along the way and on completion of the challenge they will receive a medal and certificate of achievement. 

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Gorleston FC

Following their success at winning the Thurlow Nunn Eastern Counties League, the FA have confirmed in which league Gorleston will play their Step 4 football next season.

This will be the highest level the Greens have ever played at. As well as the new league, Gorleston will compete in the FA Trophy instead of the Vase.

Surprisingly, Gorleston have played in the FA Trophy previously, between 1974 and 1978.

For those unfamiliar with the English football league system, known as the football pyramid, it is a series of leagues with promotion and relegation between them with the idea being that, in theory, a team like Gorleston could, potentially, work their way up to the Premier League, which is the top level.

Below the Premier League is the Championship, where Norwich City will be playing, then League One featuring Ipswich Town followed by League Two.

Next comes the National League System (NLS), which is known as non-league football.

Step 1 of the NLS is the National League which is the only league in the System which is not regionalised.

Older readers may remember this as being called the Conference. Winners of this are promoted into League Two and teams at the bottom relegated to Step 2.

Step 2 consists of two divisions: National League North and National League South.

Then, Step 3, is four leagues: the Northern Premier League Premier Division, Southern League Central Division, Southern League South Division and the Isthmian League Premier Division.

Gorleston will be playing in one of the eight Step 4 leagues and have been placed in the Isthmian League Division One North.

There are a number of teams in Division One North that Gorleston have played in the last decade or so. AFC Sudbury, Bury Town, Coggeshall Town,

Felixstowe and Walton Utd, Lowestoft Town and Stowmarket Town were all recently in the Eastern Counties League whilst Basildon Utd and Hullbridge Sports have been recent foes in the FA Cup.

Others in the division are Brentwood Town, East Thurrock Utd, Grays Athletic, Gt Wakering Rovers, Hashtag Utd, Heybridge Swifts, Maldon & Tiptree, New Salamis, Tilbury and Witham Town.

And, rivalries will be renewed with Wroxham.

Whilst Gorleston know what league they will be in, they don't yet know where they will be playing their home fixtures.

Unfortunately, the landlords of Emerald Park have opted not to renew the lease for another year. With

the new ground at the College not able to be used yet, the Greens are effectively homeless so it appears a groundshare with somebody will be happening.



Little did we know that the celebrations to mark the winning of the league were also the Emerald Park farewell party. But, what a way to finish.

The end of one era but the beginning of another.




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

This is not the sort of problem you would expect to encounter on Bells Road today. A herd of cows heading for milking! The cows are just turning into the opening alongside the house on the right of the picture, 9 Bells Road. This opening is now called Matthes Courtyard. In the 1908 Kelly's Directory at number 9 was Mrs. Harriet Bullock, a widow, who was running a dairy at this address and also a shop at 64 Bells Road. Prior to the death of her husband they ran a dairy at Kennel Farm in Warren Road, Hopton. Although technically in the Parish of Hopton-on-Sea, for most purposes it is today regarded as being in Gorleston. The local and county boundaries have been moved many times over the years.

The Bible offers a gold mine of beautiful poetry, extraordinary history and wonderful teaching. Indeed it is said, the Bible contains everything necessary for abundant and eternal life. Among the nuggets of gold buried away in the Old Testament is the "Book of Proverbs". This book begins: "The proverbs of Solomon, son of David and king of Israel. Here are proverbs that will help you to recognise wisdom and good advice, and understand sayings with deep meanings. They can teach you how to live intelligently and how to be honest, just, and fair."

At the beginning of the 10th century BC, Solomon's power, wealth and fame eclipsed those of almost every other king in the world. His story can be found in the early chapters of the "First Book of Kings". One night the LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream and said, "Ask for whatever you want me to give you." Rather than ask for wealth or a long life, Solomon asked God to give him a discerning heart to govern God's people and to distinguish between right and wrong.

God was pleased that Solomon had asked for this and said to him, "Since you have asked for this and not for long life or wealth for yourself, nor have asked for the death of your enemies but for discernment in administering justice, I will do what you have asked. I will give you a wise and discerning heart, so that there will never have been anyone like you, nor will there ever be. Moreover, I will give you what you have not asked for – both riches and honour – so that in your lifetime you will have no equal among kings. And if you walk in my ways and obey my statutes and commands as David your father did, I will give you a long life." It is recorded that kings all over the world heard of Solomon's wisdom and sent people to listen to him. The most well-known of these was the Queen of Sheba.

We all know and use proverbs such as "a stitch in time saves nine" or "don't cross your bridges before you come to them". But the proverbs of King Solomon contain wisdom of a different order. Many will be familiar to you. We will read some of them next month.

The Society had generously sponsored the event and had provided the finance for the polished granite plinth.




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The Shell Seekers by Rosamunde Pilcher reviewed by Gorleston Library

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Life Afloat

So, my first big mishap - it was around 3pm when we decided to stop on the outskirts of a large town to re-provision the boat. Pillage was equipped to accommodate its original tall owner therefore there were discrepancies as to what would suit my own small frame. An

adjustment had been made to the guard rail... a safety measure composed of thigh height double strips of wire coated in plastic, which run around the edge of the boat. This was the day I was to have sole responsibility for practising jumping ashore holding the ropes.

Of course I knew I needed to step over the guard rail, one leg after the other, and wait on the narrow ledge of deck, then when we were close in, hop neatly onto dry land, but... as Richard and Adrian smoothly leapt ashore and Pillage came in beside the bank on a sudden little rush, what I actually did was – panic – leading to a muddled hoisting of one leg over the guard rail but unable to raise my second leg high enough leaving me straddled, the right foot ready to jump, but the left leg remaining behind the wire. I stared as my petrified limbs refused to obey leaving me suspended, clutching the ropes with legs akimbo.

Everything now appeared to happen in slow motion as predictably Pillage began to slide away from the bank. "Throw the ropes" yelled Richard, racing alongside the hull – well, actually his words were not quite as polite as that. Galvanised by his shouts, heart pounding, somehow I managed to get both legs back behind the rail and hurled the ropes towards the shore. Hurled them yes - but not far enough and my efforts fell miserably into the canal, several feet from the tow path. A big splash and Richard was in the water which fortunately wasn't too deep, Adrian leaned down, swiftly grabbed the ropes from the dripping skipper and pulled the boat safely alongside the bank.

Over a calming cup of tea, we laughed at my expense, agreeing I had just been guilty of everyone's idea of a classical boating comedy turn. Both men made half-hearted remarks about me not doing too badly, however I feared there was still some way to go, for instance the skipper had me marked as fourth mate and as there were only three of us on board...?

The following day we reached Bethune, a pretty historic town and well worth the four-kilometre walk. Richard and I had visited Bethune a few years earlier whilst driving through France during a summer holiday and I remembered it well, especially the large bustling cobbled square full of noise and atmosphere. Dominating everything was the clock tower whose melodic bells chimed ding-dong every quarter, and on the hour there was a loud tinkling of the song "A Scottish Soldier", although I expect he is probably called something else in a foreign country.

The narrow streets around the square were quaint and we window shopped, looking at stylish fashion and European furnishings which were quite different to what we had back home. After we had purchased the essentials, we spent a happy half hour buying a couple of frivolous items plus a few postcards for friends and family back home. The weather was glorious, and we drifted back to the square to enjoy our first dining experience since Calais. It was also a treat to relax on proper chairs, soaking up the scene as the crowds milled to and fro. We were also introduced to Pastis a favourite national drink; it contained a fair amount of aniseed but tasted very pleasant. Time flew away while we lingered to catch "The Scottish Soldier" at three pm and again at four, before staggering back to Pillage laden with food, wine, bottled water and our stash of goodies.

Adrian and Richard elected to make a light supper and I settled down, comfortably propped against the warm wall of the cabin and began to write down a few notes.

The Chauny was dimly lit and our shadows were thrown onto the damp walls - shadows that eerily moved along with us in the gloom. Our torches helped a little, but even so I couldn't quite shake off a faint sense of unease. It was such a relief when suddenly, far off, a pin prick of light appeared. I strained to watch as the tiny dot grew larger until finally we emerged into the brightness of late afternoon and could gulp in deep breaths of fresh air.

Two kilometres later we tied up safely and it was time to raise our posh glasses filled to the brim from the newly bought bottles of cold water.... or as some would say with the deep pleasure of "Adam's Ale".

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Farm visit helps students get over niche fears of livestock

A project aimed at increasing the confidence and resilience of young women at East Norfolk Sixth Form College (EN) is proving to be a great success.

It is amazing, given that we live in a rural area, that none of the students had ever visited a farm. The visit gave them an insight into life on a farm and the local farming community and the opportunities that exist within the industry. This type of experience is an essential part of our community engagement and is clearly valued by the students that take part."

Ramblings of a Displaced Cockney

"Well known in Gorleston as the former Principal of the East Norfolk Sixth Form College, our Displaced Cockney is Laurie Poulson whose travels in life have taken him from birth in the East End of London, all around England, until he came to Gorleston in 1999, where he has been ever since."

What makes a Cockney?

We probably all know that the traditional definition of a Cockney's birth qualification is to have been born within the sounds of the bells of St. Maryle-Bow church which stands just to the East of St. Paul's Cathedral.

This could be seen as being complicated by the fact that the bells were destroyed by enemy bombing in 1941, having already been silent since June 1940, although it is very unlikely that bombers needed the bells to guide them to Central London! They didn't ring again until they were replaced in 1961. Does this mean that there were no true Cockneys born during those twenty years of the silence of the bells? Nonsense of course, "within the sound of the bells" clearly carries the sense of "if they are ringing" with no compunction on potential Cockneys of being born exactly on the hour, to fit in with the bells!

In practice, the prevailing wind comes from the West in London (one of the reasons why the smelly industrial stuff was concentrated in East London and the poshest neighbourhoods were upwind in the West!). This means that on most days, the bells can be heard further from the church as you go East, so Cockneys are more associated with the East End than the West End.

My personal claim to being a true born Cockney actually lies just a mile to the North-West of the bells, certainly within earshot! I was born in the old Royal Free Hospital, which was then in Gray's Inn Road, well within the four and a half miles North-West to Highgate, where the story says that Dick Whittington heard the Bow Bells calling him back to the City, with the promise that he would someday be the Lord Mayor of London. Whether this story is true or not, Richard Whittington (1354-1427) did indeed become Lord Mayor.

The roots of Cockneydom lie even further back. At the start of the 14th Century, "The Land of Cockaigne" was widely thought of in Europe as a land of unrestrained luxury, especially in terms of food and drink, a peasant's Utopia. The term Cockney even appears in Geoffrey Chaucer's Canterbury Tales around 1386. It tended to have the meaning of a "child tenderly brought up" but was adopted over time as an expression of "London-ness". Over the years, it has gathered its own traditions, such as the pearly kings and queens, together with its own dialect, accent and slang. The accent is said to have owed a lot to old Essex and in recent years has spread back along the Thames to become "Estuarine English". It has spread as far as Thetford after the expansion of the town after the war, when the London County Council supported the town to provide homes for "bombed-out" Londoners.. It also picked up lots of words from the various immigrant populations who settled in the East End. Examples are kushti (good) and wonga (money) from Romani and kosher (legitimate) and stumm (staying silent) from Yiddish.

slang. This probably started as a sort of private language amongst East End costermongers, sellers of various goods but especially fruit and veg sold from handcarts in the street or market. This allowed them to hold conversations which their customers couldn't understand. This is rather like the private language "Polari" which uses things like "back-slang" (pronouncing a word as if it were written backwards). This was popular amongst entertainers and circus people but was later adopted by London's gay community and popularised in "Round the Horne" on the Radio in the 1960s by the characters Julian and Sandy (voiced by Kenneth Williams and Hugh Paddick playing Polari speaking actors).

When I was studying in 1968-69 for a PGCE (teaching qualification) at the Institute of Education, which was then under the Senate House in Mallet Street, our local café was next to the original Dillon's bookshop (now Waterstones) and was called "The Pride of Cockaigne". No doubt we listened to Edward Elgar's "Cockaigne Overture" on the record payer (remember them?).

At one time, my son Ed lived in Coronation Gardens in Leyton, just a hundred yards from Leyton Orient's football ground. I needed some cash so went to an ATM in Leyton High Road. Inserting my card, the machine asked me which language I would like to use: English, Polish or Cockney! Home indeed!
