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

The Rockin' Rev



There are mixed reactions to the resurrection of Jesus. Some people accept that Jesus physically rose from the dead as an undeniable fact of history. Some people think the whole story is a foolish legend that has caused more problems than it is worth. Some people are intentionally hostile. They don't reject the resurrection because of honest doubt or lack of evidence. They denounce it because they hate the things of God.


There was no hesitation or doubt in the reaction of the women who, on the first Easter morning, went to look at the tomb where the body of Jesus had been placed and then sealed with a big rock rolled in front of the entrance. They responded to instructions from an angel of the Lord and hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy. Jesus had risen from the dead. They must run to tell his disciples the news.



As they hurried away, the risen Jesus met them and greeted them in such a way that seemed too casual, too ordinary, and too mundane for such a momentous occasion. Immediately recognising their Lord, they clasped his feet and worshipped him. At last the full reality of the resurrection was beginning









to solidify in the minds and hearts of those women.

There's a great temptation in all of us to turn the Christian faith into a "head game" of doctrines, articles of faith and theological principles. There is a great temptation in all of us to reduce the Christian faith to a world limited to the thoughts between our ears.

Don't get me wrong, I believe that all those things matter. But Jesus did not die and rise from the dead so that people could someday write theology. He did it so that people would be willing to carry the message of Christianity to others. He did it so that his followers would know that he will always be with them.

In a world that has been ravaged by the coronavirus pandemic the resurrection of Jesus dares us to believe that life has triumphed over death, that good has triumphed over evil, that love has triumphed over hate, and that hope has triumphed over despair.

New Children's waiting area in the Emergency Department (ED)

A new waiting area for children and young people opened on Monday 15 February 2021 as part of our improvements to the hospital.

This means that our children and young people now have their own modern and spacious designated area to wait for treatment, replacing a small area which was no longer fit-for-purpose.

We are about to embark on the second phase of the project which includes a full refurbishment of the existing adult waiting room, the reception area and constructing a new main entrance to the department.

Despite being extremely busy, staff have again gone "above and beyond" by setting up and running a Vaccination Hub in the Louise Hamilton Centre.

Jessica Collins - How a mother has turned a Tragedy into a Tribute



It must be every parent's worst nightmare. April 8th 2021 would have been Jessica's 19th birthday, her suicide in July 2016 devastated her family but has become a venture to help other families. Raising awareness has become Lee-Anne Collins' mission.


In July 2016, Lee-Anne and her family had no idea that her daughter Jessica had any specific problems over and above that facing the family as a whole and of the average 14 year old girl. Teachers regarded her as 'incredibly intelligent' and described her as 'always smiling'. She had already won a music scholarship from Cambridge University and her future looked bright.

Living with her mother, father, twin brother and younger sister in Hopton, they had been devastated by the loss of Lee-Anne's mother to cancer 8 months previously. Jessica had seemed to be particularly affected by losing her Nan but at the time, nothing in her behaviour indicated her state of mind. The family found Jessica unresponsive on her bed in July 2016.

It has been suggested that the trigger for her suicide could have involved social media. Lee-Anne feels that social media, particularly Snapchat where messages disappear instantly, can have a terrible impact on the mental health of users. She said "it's a worry for most parents what their children are doing on screens when alone and unfortunately in some cases it's too late".

Her mother describes her as incredibly talented and spoke of her own suffering from PTSD following Jessica's death. Something changed during Lockdown and her thoughts turned to how she could use her tragic experience to help others. Lee-Anne was worrying about how Lockdown would be affecting children and teenagers and felt if she could talk to other families who were experiencing concerns she may be able to prevent a similar tragedy.

Having set up the Jessica Collins Child Suicide Awareness page she decided to use her story to promote children's mental health and to help signpost the Papyrus Charity which supports young people who may be contemplating suicide. Everything she researched told her that talking about problems and encouraging feelings to be shared could help with anyone considering suicide. Her experience has been that parents feel helpless. By speaking to them and encouraging them to talk about suicidal feelings with children and teenagers may head off another tragedy. She has been selling wristbands which have raised £747 for Papyrus and used her story to raise awareness in the media. A Jessica Collins music award at Cliff Park Ormiston Academy is being presented to someone different every year in remembrance of her talent.

Corporation Bus Services In Gorleston

Great Yarmouth Corporation's blue buses were once a familiar sight around Gorleston, they had replaced the electric tram service that had closed during October 1930. In the 1950s and 60s blue buses in Gorleston all ran (except for the Gorleston Circular route) to and from Great Yarmouth town centre and their routes were designated alphabetically. However, the services around Great Yarmouth, Caister and the Fish Wharf were designated with a route number.

Route A terminated at the southern end of the Magdalen Estate. Route B went to Gorleston Beach, terminating near the Floral Hall. Cooper's shop at the bottom of Cliff Hill and the corner of Englands Lane often stated in their advertising that the "Gorleston 'B' Bus Stops Outside." Route C usually terminated at The Links Hotel on Gorleston Cliffs, but a few travelled further along Marine Parade terminating at the Yallop Avenue and Links Road junction. Route D terminated at the junction of Brasenose Avenue and Lowestoft Road travelling via Church Road and Middleton Road. A special service D that terminated at Beevor Road Great Yarmouth, was laid on each morning for South Denes factory workers. Service E (Elmhurst) also terminated at the Brasenose Avenue junction but travelled via Lowestoft Road rather than Middleton Road. The last journeys of each day always terminated at the Caister Road bus depot in Great Yarmouth and the bus destination boards indicated "Depot Only."

The Transport Depot had been built by Boulton and Paul of Norwich during 1898 in readiness for the opening of the Great Yarmouth electric tramway. Just over thirty years later, in 1933 the tram service closed with all its routes being replaced by buses. The building then became the Corporation's bus depot. During World War Two the depot was severely damaged during air raids and was rebuilt after the war, by F.R. Hipperson & Son Ltd, with a distinctive Art Deco facade.

During August 2019, a blue plaque was placed on the depot's offices to commemorate these events and was unveiled by Steve Hewitt of the East Norfolk Transport Users in the presence of the Depot Manager, Richard Delahay, the First Bus Operations Manager, Alvin Parker,



Fleet Engineer, Mark Reynolds, and members of the Great Yarmouth Local History and Archaeological Society.

Vets and Pets



Spring tick alert!



As the weather warms up and we head towards the Spring and Summer months, ticks become more active, posing a risk to both pets and their owners.

Ticks can be found in long grasses and wooded areas, especially where there is wildlife such as deer and hedgehogs. Here, they wait

for a human or animal to brush past them, so that they can jump on and feed. They attach using their mouthparts and will feed on blood from their host for several days before dropping off.

Although pets rarely seem troubled by them, ticks can spread diseases that pose serious health risks:


Lyme disease is the most well-known disease spread by ticks. Affected pets (and also humans) can develop swollen

joints and stiffness. They can also develop a fever, anorexia and lethargy.

Babesiosis an emerging tick-borne disease, destroying red blood cells and causing acute signs of anaemia in affected dogs (but not humans). It is mainly found in mainland Europe, but there is a risk of spread into the UK and Ireland.

What about prevention? Current evidence suggests that tick-borne diseases take many hours after tick attachment to be transmitted. Veterinary prescription medications for the prevention of ticks often kill these pesky parasites quicker

than their non-prescription counterparts, which is very important in the prevention of tick-borne diseases and they are available as spot-ons, tablets or collars.

Monthly Recipe

Fleetwoods Butchers

Healthy Lamb

Preparation time - 30 mins, cooking time - 1 hour, serves 8



Ingredients

- 2 onions, peeled and thickly sliced
- 2 large carrots, thickly sliced
- Boneless leg of lamb (around 1.5kg), trimmed of excess fat
- 4 garlic cloves, sliced
- 3 rosemary sprigs, leaves picked
- 2 tbsp olive oil

For the veg

- 800g baby carrots, peeled
- 500g frozen broad beans
- 600g frozen peas
- small bunch mint, finely chopped
- small bunch parsley, finely chopped
- 1 lemon, zested and juiced

Method

1. Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Put the onions and sliced carrots in a large roasting tray. Remove any string from the lamb and put it on top of the veg, skin-side up. Pierce the lamb with the tip of a knife to make small pockets in the meat, add garlic slices and a few rosemary leaves to the holes. Rub the lamb with 1 tbsp olive oil and season. Pour 100ml water into the tray.

- Roast uncovered for 45 minutes at the top of the oven. Check the internal temperature, it should read 60C for medium (pink). Cook for another 15 minutes for well done. Rest the meat under foil for 10 mins while you cook the veg.
- 3. Bring a large pan of salted water to the boil. Add the carrots, and cook for 8 minutes until tender, adding the peas and beans for the last 2 minutes. Drain the veg and toss with 1 tbsp oil, chopped herbs, lemon zest and juice. Season to taste.
- 4. Carve the lamb into thin slices. Spread the veg onto a large warmed serving platter and arrange the meat in the middle.











I did similar events at the Ocean Rooms and a few more over the next 18 months at the Bier Garden.


The only trouble with success is that other people want a slice of the cake, so we had other promoters doing things alongside the clubs themselves, which meant my slice was getting smaller.



Commit your work to the Lord, and your plans will be established. (Proverbs 16:3)


Cast all your anxieties on God, because he cares for you. (1 Peter 5:7)

The next part of Stage 1 takes place on the 29th March, which amongst other things allows outside sports facilities to reopen, meaning I can go back to enjoying my hobby, which is golf and meeting up with friends again. Following all of this Stage 2 will be introduced, providing Covid cases have not gone back up, on April 12th. This date, of course is the date that we at Fusion are looking forward to, as we are included in this stage and of course we can once again open our doors and start trading after 16 weeks of being closed since Christmas eve, that would conclude 34 weeks of being closed out of the last 52.

Of course opening the doors once again is not as easy at it sounds as there are many things to consider. The very first thing that we had to decide was how we are going to arrange appointments for our customers, as we do not want to start taking bookings too early and then have the opening date moved because of an increase in the number of Covid cases following the opening of the Stage1 procedure.

What we decided was to take clients names and details and make a list, so when the date of April 12th is confirmed we can start ringing around and organise our appointment books. We have decided that the date we will start to ring around our Clients will be the week before we are due to open on April 12th. Of course Monday April 5th is Easter Monday, so we will start ringing from Tuesday April 6th. The phone lines at Fusion are permanently diverted to my mobile, so therefore our lines are open 24/7 if you wish to call and have your name added to the call list; only thing I will say is please be patient as we have all 4 of our lines at Fusion diverted to one mobile. We will also discuss with

our staff, opening hours, shifts and rotas and anything we need to do to get our clients serviced as soon as we possibly can.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all businesses opening again at this stage, including fellow hairdressers, the very best of luck and hope that we are all able to try and get back on our feet as soon as possible.

Of course it is not just hairdressers that have been closed in these lockdowns, The High Street, as every other High Street in the country, has been hit hard. The first lockdown ended up being very difficult for everyone. Being closed from March 24th to July 3rd was bad enough, when we opened it went crazy and for 5 weeks we very busy, then it just fell off the edge of a cliff. People spent the whole of last year so scared to actually come out of their houses and as I have said we went from manically busy to only serving about 40% of our normal trade, eventually leading to another lockdown on November 3rd. This time however we have the luxury of the vaccine, which should make people a lot more relaxed to want to come back out and try to get back to normal as soon as possible.

Getting away from the woes of the last 12 months, I just can't let the moment go to say what a great season my other love, Norwich City are having, it really does help to deflect the worries and strifes of everyday life to have something to look forward to. Last season not only were we in lockdown but City were losing week after week eventually getting relegated. This time we may be in Lockdown at the moment but we have the luxury of the vaccine, normality about to resume and City looking like they are heading back to the premiership again. It's really ironic the last time I went to Carrow Rd in March 2020 was to watch a premier league game against Leicester City, here we are missing a whole year of going to Football and my next game could also be a premier League game this coming August, fingers crossed.



On a personal note I would like to congratulate my son and his partner on the birth of our tenth grandchild, on Valentine's Day at 3:51am little Arla Mae Huggins was born, bringing a lot of joy to the family.

Tomorrow is definitely going to be a better day!!

To kickstart the competition, Cel Spellman, star of Netflix's White Lines and BBC Radio 1, surprised a group of year seven students at Ormiston Venture Academy, via a special Zoom call.

Cel invited the children to be the first to get creative. The students were then given the opportunity to talk about their chosen artwork creations with Cel and explain why it is important to them.

Cel, who is a WWF ambassador said: "The Creative Earth art competition is such a unique and exciting opportunity for children from across the UK to have their voice heard and show world leaders exactly the kind of world they want to live in, inherit and pass on to future generations. I'm asking as many under-16s as possible to please get involved and be part of something special as we aim to create a better, greener, sustainable future, and call on world leaders to commit to making that a reality and bring about the change we so desperately need to see, reminding them it's young people who will live with the consequences of our actions now."





Creative Earth artwork entries will be judged by a celebrity panel and COP26 President Alok Sharma in Spring 2021. Special prizes will be awarded for the best artwork in each age group. Judges will also select the best pieces to be displayed at the COP26 summit in November next year.

Alok Sharma, COP26 President said: "Across the world, young people are leading the call for climate action and we want to make sure this is properly recognised at COP26 in Glasgow. That is why I hope young people from across the country will seize this opportunity to showcase their vision for a greener future."

Simon Gilbert-Barnham, Principal at Ormiston Venture Academy, said: "It's not every day that Gorleston pupils get a chance to influence the UK Prime Minister and other world leaders! This competition is an incredible opportunity for young people to present their vision for a greener, healthier and happier planet. Everyone at Ormiston Venture Academy is over the moon to be taking part in the Creative Earth art competition and we can't wait to see the entries that come in from young people around the country."

The *Together For Our Planet* campaign aims to work with businesses, civil society groups, schools and the public across the UK to help build awareness around the importance of tackling climate change in the run up to the COP26.

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Gorleston FC

Work has begun on the building of Gorleston FC's new ground at the East Norfolk College.

The new facility comprises two changing rooms, social space, two stands and a 3g pitch and has been made possible thanks to investment from the Premier League, The FA, the Government's Football Foundation and Pleasure and Leisure, Gt Yarmouth.

Club Chairman, Jamie Humphries, said "Not only will this fantastic facility benefit GFC but it will be a great sporting venue for the students at East Norfolk College and the local community."

With a summer date suggested for completion, plus the news that the Thurlow Nunn League have curtailed the season due to the pandemic, it is possible the Greens played their final competitive match at Emerald Park without realising it – a 4-0 win over Thetford back in December - although Norfolk FA are currently considering whether it will be possible to complete this season's Senior Cup competition, where Gorleston are scheduled to play a home tie versus Thetford.

There has been a change off the field for the Gorleston Ladies team. Sadly, Sophie Gillett decided to step down as manager in January. The club have appointed Keegan Snell and John Barrett as joint managers. oversee Gorleston's football development plan for their female footballers of all age groups. Keegan and John are no strangers to the female game, having run female teams for the past 5 years.

Last month I told you about the club's pre-second world war history.

Following the war, the first few seasons were easily forgotten, although 'history' was made on 19th October 1946 when the Greens suffered their heaviest ever defeat, losing 13-0 away at Chelmsford City Reserves.

In 1949, local builder Mr H.G. Holmes was appointed Chairman and Mr J.G. Dixon vice Chairman with Mr Len Loveday elected secretary. They appointed a new player/ coach, Bert 'Sailor' Brown and, in 1950, decided to turn semi-professional.

In the 1951/52 season Gorleston gained national fame when they reached the First Round Proper of the FA Cup where they were handed an away tie at third division Leyton Orient. They earned a 2-2 draw, thanks to goals from Harry Chapman and Jackie Hunter. Several thousand fans turned up at the Recreation Ground to see the replay which was a goalless draw.

The third and decisive game was a memorable cup-tie, in front of over 12000 spectators at Arsenal's old ground, Highbury. Orient went 2-0 up before Hunter pulled a goal back but the Greens were 3-1 down by half time. Chapman pulled another goal back but, with fifteen minutes left, it was 5-2 to Orient. Then Jimmy Guy converted a penalty before Hunter made it 4-5 with two minutes remaining. Despite valiant efforts the Greens couldn't find an equaliser.

The 1952/53 season saw the Greens win the Eastern

Counties League for the first time in their history. They also won the Norfolk Senior Cup for the tenth time and lost in the finals of the East Anglian Cup and League Cup.



The League Cup was eventually won for the first and only time, so far, in 1956 when Spurs 'A' were beaten 3-1 in the final. They again reached the F.A. Cup 1st round proper in 1957/58 season, but this time were well beaten by Gillingham 10-1.

By the end of the fifties the club faced severe financial problems and were forced to withdraw from the Eastern Counties League and move back into the Norfolk and Suffolk league. In 1964, Gorleston became founder members of the Anglian Combination. They then rejoined the Eastern Counties League in 1969 after winning the Anglian Combination Premier Division title, along with the Norfolk Senior Cup, beating Downham 2-1 in the final thanks to goals from Sammy Morgan and Ronnie Piper.

In the ensuing 15 seasons the Greens won the ECL Championship on 3 occasions: in 1972/73, 1979/80 and 1980/81.


By now, Northern Ireland international Sammy Morgan was back at the club after a professional career which included Port Vale, Aston Villa, Brighton and Cambridge Utd. John Linford was about to turn pro with Ipswich Town and then Chairman, Jimmy Jones, surprised everybody by announcing the signing of England's 1966 World Cup winner, Martin Peters, for the 1981/82 season.

That was to be the last season on the Recreation Ground before the Greens made their move to Emerald Park. The final ever game on the Rec came on May 8th 1982. Unfortunately, Gorleston lost 2-1 to Newmarket. The last ever goal on the Recca was scored by Micky Woods.


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
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
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Springing into Creativity: new community arts & nature project

Gorleston-based Community Artist Genevieve Rudd is working in partnership with original projects; to lead Yarmouth Springs Eternal. The community arts, walking and nature project will take place this Spring, and is inspired by Genevieve's walks around the Gorleston area during Lockdown.

After growing up in Gorleston and attending East Norfolk Sixth Form College, I moved to London in 2008 to study BA Hons Photographic Arts at University of Westminster. It's where I began my career in Community Arts before returning to Gorleston in 2013. I've had the pleasure of working creatively with communities across the region and this year, I'll be focusing on a new project, Yarmouth Springs Eternal.


Whilst indoors under 'Stay at Home' orders this year with a reduced freelance workload, I would often find myself daydreaming out of the window. I notice rows of packed terrace houses with square windows looking back at me, blocks of dense leylandii hedge and intersections of alleyways. I can see shed roofs in weathered shades of brown and grey, every so often featuring a prowling cat. Birds zip from tree to tree and clouds swirl in ever-changing formations against skies of pink, blue, grey and white. For me, the Lockdown experience has highlighted that 'experiencing the natural world' isn't a phenomena happening elsewhere in vast conservationmanaged pastoral landscapes, it's also the vernacular view from my desk window and found on daily walks around town. In fact, studies have shown that simply looking at nature through a window can help boost wellbeing and aid recovery from illness (Velarde et al, 2007).

Even if we are lucky enough to live close to natural spaces for walking, such as the beach and parks here in Gorleston, there are many access barriers. Friends of the Earth research (England's Green Space Gap, 2020) has highlighted 'green space deprivation', recognising the correlation between low income and ethnicity, and access to natural spaces. Last summer, research found that 12% of people in the UK have no access to a garden, and that Black people in England are nearly four times as likely as White people to have no access to outdoor space at home (Marshall et al, 2020). The Co-op's Community Wellbeing Index confirmed a correlation between living close to green spaces and a community's overall wellbeing



too. The borough of Great Yarmouth's own Community Wellbeing Index score has a low 32 point rating for 'Housing, space environment', and including rating the prevalence of green spaces, which is 20 below points the national average. It can take shifts in

government level policy to make significant large-scale changes to communities, but I believe there is a place for nurturing small, personal and 'grass-roots' (quite literally!) experiences with nature, whatever that might look like locally.





that drives you (although they're skills and tools you use) but instead, your capacity for empathy in your role as facilitator. I started my career as a freelance Community Artist 10 years ago, but over the past year, I didn't always have the energy to 'make art' and I often felt disconnected from the communities I was engaging with remotely. So I kept it simple, using my photographic eye on daily walks to notice the small things: wildflowers growing in the pavement cracks, brickwork patterns, leaf shapes, shadows and birdwatching. These walks inspired Yarmouth Springs Eternal.

Yarmouth Springs Eternal explores personal relationships to the natural world through contemporary arts, highlighting overlooked and everyday interactions with nature. I recognise that this project alone cannot influence the amount of local green space available, but I aim to support people to benefit from the wellbeing-boosting impact of experiencing nature and making art. It's a short-term funded project with longterm ambitions.

During the programme, we'll run a series of community walks/ workshops with adults referred from local charities supporting people with lived experience of migration, insecure housing and homelessness. These groups have been identified as least likely to have access to nature, but more likely to be on the front-line of climate crisis. During May and June, there will be a public exhibition, free public artist-led walks/workshops, and at the Summer Solstice, we'll launch a creative arts and nature resource booklet. Events will be confirmed on the project social media and will be risk assessed in-line with COVID guidelines.

I'm leading Yarmouth Springs Eternal in partnership with Great Yarmouth-based arts charity originalprojects;. Events will be based at PRIMEyarc, their new creative space in Market Gates Shopping Centre. The project is funded by Arts Council England, Norfolk & Norwich Festival's Creative Individuals Norfolk, East Anglia Art Fund, Norfolk County Council and Better Together Norfolk.

We played upon the marshes. We had rigged our homemade kites. They flew for miles over Breydon, almost fading out of sight. We loved to fish for stannicles with twig and cotton and worm, A jam jar to put them in so we could take them home.

Eleven Plus arrived too soon, a new school on its way. We bought some pens and pencils, new clothes for a special day. We would meet new friends and teachers, new things we'd have to learn. Preparing for our future gave rise for great concern.

But now those days are in the past, an OAP. In post. My memories hold good times, some for me to boast. Today the children only remember the broken games and toys. They play alone on Play Stations forgetting other girls and boys.

I started by recalling how sad I felt at first. When seeing all the empty spaces reminding me of my birth. My home no longer existed but my heart will always be there. Those happy times, I've spent with you, in some small part to share.
